

Built to replace the old Woodview Campus, the new Thurrock Campus opens in September 2014.


Ultra-modern new buildings

September 2013 saw the opening of The Forum Southend-on-Sea, a £27 million ultra-modern library and learning zone, which is located opposite our Southend Campus. The Forum Southend-on-Sea houses a huge range of books and resources as well as over 100 new computers and wifi access for your laptop and mobile devices.

Built to replace the old Woodview Campus, the new Thurrock Campus opens September 2014. Situated in Grays High Street, the £45 million construction is a milestone for education and enables the College to offer students high quality teaching and facilities whilst fulfilling the skills needs of employers in the area.

Completing the trilogy of new buildings is a new Basildon Campus that will provide the very best facilities and new courses for local people. This new campus is still in the planning stage but is scheduled to open 2015-2016.

Our centres



Basildon Campus

The Basildon Campus offers a range of vocational courses set in realistic work environments. Courses include childcare, hairdressing, beauty therapy, motor vehicle, engineering, health and social care, public services and sport.

Our trainee hairdressing salons are Wella Centres of Excellence, which means Wella recognise that we offer the highest level of training and links with industry. Our animal science students can get to grips with a variety of animals at the animal management centre.

Sports facilities include a five-a-side football pitch, basketball, netball, badminton and squash courts plus a fully equipped gym. There is also a greenhouse for science students. Free parking is available at the campus.



Southend Campus

Located next to Southend Central station, our Southend Campus offers A-level courses and an impressive range of vocational subjects in realistic work environments using cutting-edge technology.

Media students get access to a high-definition television studio, radio studio, fully-equipped photographic studio with digital SLR cameras, dedicated art and design work spaces, performing arts studios and a journalism newsroom. Sound and music production students have access to Xtreme, our well-equipped off-site recording and rehearsal studio, which includes mixing, recording, rehearsal and sequencing facilities.



Southend Campus also has science labs, an animal management centre, a sports lab and a 250 seat Performance Pod. There are over 2,000 PCs and plenty

of Apple Mac computers to do everything from graphic design to film editing. We even have our own restaurant and coffee shop staffed by our catering students.

Our Beauty Academy in Queens Road offers reasonably priced treatments to the public. Sports students will use our Wellstead Gardens sports facility which features a gym and playing fields.

Students can get refreshed at Scoff and the Atrium Café on campus while there is a huge selection of shops, restaurants, leisure and entertainment venues right on your doorstep.

Thurrock Campus

You are set to become the first students in the brand new Thurrock Campus, located in Grays town centre, which will open September 2014.

The campus consists of two impressive three and four storey buildings which include cutting-edge training facilities for teaching gas, heating and sustainable technologies along with ultra-modern beauty and hairdressing salons, training kitchens and specialist centres for health care and childcare.


Students from South Essex College have the opportunity to work in roles including sound engineers, lighting designers and runners when professional companies hire the building.

Costs of study

Many further education students will not have to pay for the cost of full-time (and some part-time) courses, but if you do, help is available. If you have any questions about the cost of study or to find out if you are eligible for financial assistance, contact the student services team on **0845 52 12345** or by email **guidance@southessex.ac.uk**



Tuition fees

Tuition fees cover the cost of tuition and examinations. You do not have to pay tuition fees if you are between 16 and 18 and have been living in the UK or an EU country for three years prior to starting your studies. If you are over 18 and/or have not been living in the UK or an EU country for three years prior to starting your studies, don't worry, as you may still be able to study for free or at a reduced cost, please refer to our website for up to date details.

If you are aged 19 or over you could be responsible for the payment of tuition fees. If this is the case, don't panic, as although you will need to pay 10% at enrolment, you can spread the remaining cost over the duration of your course.

If you are aged 24 or over, new Advanced Learning Loans are available to cover the cost of tuition fees for courses at level 3 or above. This means you won't pay anything upfront.

Further funding assistance

The discretionary funds are available to assist students with an identified financial need. These funds can be used to purchase essential learning resources such as books, uniform, equipment and important trips. In some circumstances a contribution towards childcare (students aged over 20 only) and travel expenses. For current criteria please refer to our website or speak with a Student Adviser.

16-19 bursary fund

If you are aged between 16 and 18 as of 31 August 2014 and your family is on a low income you may be eligible to receive a discretionary award towards the additional costs associated with your course. In some circumstances you may also be awarded a fixed amount to help support you during your studies.

Discretionary Learner Support Fund

If you are aged 19+ as of 31 August 2014 and your family is on a low income you may be eligible to receive a contribution towards the additional costs associated with your course.

National Express Foundation Bursaries

Student services is proud to work in partnership with the National Express Foundation. We have been awarded funding to be able to offer hardship bursaries to our 19+ students. If you are studying a full-time FE course, live close to the c2c line and your household income is below £10,000 you can apply for a £500 bursary. All applications are considered by a panel, due to the limited number of bursaries.

Travel assistance

If South Essex College is the nearest provider of your chosen course and if you live more than three miles from the College campus, your local authority can tell you if you are eligible for help with travel. Care to Learn (for 16-19 year olds) – If you are a parent and aged under 20, you may be eligible to apply for childcare and travel support.








Every student at South Essex College is automatically a member of the Student Union. The Union is run by students for students.

Whether your end goal is higher education or employment, this flow chart shows you the natural progression you can make to get you where you want to be.



A-levels

A-levels provide you with a traditional pathway to university and offer prospective employers the higher level qualifications that they look for. You can read more about A-levels, as well as a full listing of the courses on offer, on page 22. Our pass rates in 2012-13 were 98.2%.

Vocational qualifications

If you are looking for higher level qualifications that combine vocational training with traditional classwork, you may be interested in vocational qualifications such as BTEC, CACHE, VTCT or City & Guilds:

- They are vocational and work-related courses, designed to accommodate needs of employers and allow students to progress to further and higher education
- They take a practical approach to learning, without missing any of the important theory on the subject
- The qualifications are extremely reputable, having been around for 25 years now, so rest assured you will be embarking on an excellent course

Study A-levels alongside vocational courses

At South Essex College you get the best of both worlds.

We offer you the chance to study vocational courses alongside A-levels. So you can study a level 3 BTEC qualification, gaining the professional skills to get you on the career ladder, alongside academic A-level subjects. Chat to us at an Open Event or during your interview to find out what's possible.





Why should I take a BTEC?

They are recognised by a large number of companies across a wide range of industries.

As well as being developed in partnership with industry representatives so all employer and student needs are met, many professional bodies offer successful BTEC students exemptions for their own accredited qualifications.

If you are not fond of taking exams and find the pressure causes you to under perform, a BTEC will allow you to undertake a number of units for which you will present evidence, based on real life work and studies. This means you can demonstrate your skills and knowledge through a practical situation rather than sweating it out in an exam hall.

You will be provided with personal guidance and support by your tutor, who will also help you meet deadlines and reach your full potential.

How do BTEC qualifications work?

There are different sizes of BTEC qualification at each level. Generally:

- The smallest is the Award
- Then the Certificate
- And the largest is the Diploma
- Unit results are graded as pass, merit or distinction

The number of units varies according to the level, design and focus of each qualification, and all students complete realistic work-based assignments, which are internally assessed.

Functional skills

Functional skills are the practical skills in English, information and communication technology (ICT) and maths that allow people to work confidently, effectively and independently in life.

Why should I do an NVQ?

An NVQ is a National Vocational Qualification. It is a work-based qualification designed to measure competence in a professional role.

An NVQ is different from a traditional taught course as it requires you to show what you currently do and how you have the underpinning knowledge necessary to do your work, as opposed to teaching and testing you on new knowledge. To prove their competence, candidates collect evidence from their workplace according to the National Occupational Standard (NOS) of the NVQ.

Completion of an NVQ shows your current and potential future employees that you are competent in your work and demonstrates an interest in continued development, improving your employability.

There are no examinations, your assessor will assess you over a period of time in your workplace and the NVQ should complement your job and demonstrate your competence.

What qualifications are equivalent to an NVQ?

Because NVQs are work-based qualifications, it is difficult to give exact academic equivalents. However, as a guide:

- Level 3 NVQ -BTEC National Certificate or Diploma
- Level 4 NVQ -BTEC Higher National Certificate or Diploma
- Level 5 NVQ -First degree or professional qualification

Apprenticeships



Learning and earning

Apprentices do real jobs for real employers. You will learn on the job, build up knowledge and skills, gain qualifications and earn money all at the same time.

You will work towards a work-based qualification such as a National Vocational Qualification (NVQ) and other nationally recognised qualifications. Employers all over the country recognise and value apprenticeships as they show that you've been trained in the skills they need.

Prospects

Apprenticeships can be demanding but they are very rewarding. Because apprenticeships train you in the skills employers want, they give you choices in your career.

If you hand deliver a CV dress to impress as if you have an interview (and no friends tagging along - go in alone).



Step 3: Know the facts

There are many reasons why employing you would help a business.

For starters there is currently funding from the National Apprenticeship Service of £1,500. This is a grant offered to businesses to employ school leavers to help with the cost of your salary. Also, as you are under 19, all the training for the apprenticeship is free. All they pay is your salary.

Step 4: Create a killer CV

A CV or curriculum vitae is a summary of what you have to offer a potential employer. It gives you the chance to sell yourself. If written well it will increase your chances of gaining an interview.

If an employer gets a lot of applicants he will pick a chosen few so make yours count.

Step 5: Find your new employer

Once you have identified some companies that you think would suit your chosen career, it's time to contact them. Do some research on the company before you call. A Google search is a great way to start.

Did you know?

One in five employers is hiring more apprentices to help them through the tough economic climate.

Over 80% of those employers who employ apprentices agree they make their workplace more productive.

81% of consumers favour using a company which takes on apprentices.

Employers who take on a 16-18 year old apprentice only pay their salary. The government will fund their training.

92% of employers who employ apprentices believe that apprenticeships lead to a more motivated and satisfied workforce.

The National Minimum Wage for apprentices is £2.68 per hour. Many employers prefer to pay more however, and research shows that the average salary is approximately £170 per week.

Step 6: Prepare for that interview

At the interview you will probably be asked some key questions, make sure you have some answers ready. Here is a guide to help you through key questions that are frequently asked by employers.

Why do you want this job?

Say if you feel it's the right organisation for you to kick-start your career.

What are your strengths?

Make these relevant to the job. If you are going to be working in a team, being a team player with good communication skills is a must to mention.

What are your weaknesses?

Turn a negative into a positive. For example, a sense of urgency to get projects completed or wanting to triple check every item in a spreadsheet can be portrayed as a strength.

Can you tell me about yourself?

Relate your background to the position being considered and relate the discussion to your skills, experience and training.

Why should I hire you?

Use this question to make yourself look good. Provide the interviewer with advantages but remember to avoid a 'know it all' attitude.

Step 7: Contact us

I've got an employer. What do I do now?

Contact the business development team on **0845 52 12345**. We can contact the employer to arrange your apprenticeship.

We will keep you informed throughout the process.

A-levels

A-levels are aimed at students who have a strong GCSE profile, are confident when taking examinations and interested in going to university. They are also suitable for students considering a college leavers' scheme (employment with higher training), higher apprenticeships and some careers.

How are A-levels structured?

AS-levels can be taken as a stand-alone qualification, or as the first part of an A-level course. AS-levels are completed at the end of the first year. A2 exams and coursework are added on to an AS-level at the end of the second year, resulting in an overall A-level grade.

What's different about studying A-levels at South Essex College?

The College is an environment where young people and adults study for a range of qualifications so it is very different to studying in a school. The atmosphere is less formal but very structured and supportive which makes it an excellent stepping stone between school and university or employment. As we are a large college of further and higher education we have excellent facilities which benefit our students. You will benefit from a recently refurbished science centre and new art studios. If you are looking for a new start in a new environment we are an excellent choice.

A standard minimum entry requirement of 5 GCSEs at Grade C or above is applicable to all applicants. These must include mathematics and English. Vocational qualifications such as a BTEC diploma cannot be substituted for 5 GCSEs.





Electronics A-level
